I enjoyed that day, as we talked and peddled and went well over the 20 minutes allotted, because there was no scrolling screen to tell us when to start or when we were done.

I guess its not always about how fast you go, or if you measure up, but, maybe, how much you enjoy the experience!

### When You Speak at Joys and Sorrows, Can You Be Heard?



Joys and Sorrows is an integral part of FUUSS services. One unfortunate aspect of this portion of the service, is that often many congregants are unable to hear what the speakers are saying. This is caused by uneasiness in speakers who are apt to be intimidated by microphone use. I’d like to pass on some information that should make it easier for one and all when using the microphone.

- ▶ Very simply- hold the microphone in a fixed position two to three inches from your mouth and KEEP IT THERE. The body of the microphone should be almost parallel to the floor. (The tail end of the mike may tilt slightly toward the floor.)

Don’t be afraid to speak out. If you feel you are too loud, you move it away from your mouth slightly (not too much!)

THE MAIN PROBLEM IS THAT FOLKS TEND TO LET THE MIKE FALL AWAY IN THEIR HAND ONCE THEY START TO SPEAK, OR LOWER THEIR VOICES WHILE THEY ARE TALKING. Keep the mike close; keep the voice level up and even.

Let us all do our part in making our services more meaningful. Don’t deprive your friends of hearing what you have to say!

## Committee on Ministry

### Are you Interested in helping us move us forward?

The Board and Rev. Holly agree that this is the year to form a "Committee On Ministry" (COM). The Committee's duty will be to lay the groundwork for a return to a formal COM when we call our Settled Minister. The Committee's goal is to "develop methods of communication in addressing issues that affect the congregation.

Besides providing welcome and information about the congregation to a new minister, the COM serves as a resource for congregational members. Members are encouraged to share concerns, suggestions and comments concerning the minister in the performance of his or her duties and interactions with the congregation. Ideally such interaction would take place between the parishioner and the minister and the COM would encourage that process. However, in the event that direct contact is uncomfortable the COM is an alternative resource. The COM would maintain ongoing communication with the minister to assure that things are going smoothly and would provide support and advice when needed.

Ideally the minister selects 2 members, and the Board selects three members from the community at large representing a cross section of the congregation. ## Peplemap Training Workshop: Understanding Yourself and Others

**October 18th and 25**

**from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.**

Dr. Chris Allen, Psychologist, Certified Life coach and Certified Peplemap Trainer offers a special complimentary 6-hour Peplemap training. Participants will complete a brief 7-item personality questionnaire that has a 95% accuracy rate of predicting your main personality type: Leader, People, Task or Free Spirit. Participants will learn about the three natural strengths of each type as well as a

"weak spot" of each type, called the "Achilles Heel". When understood, our Achilles Heel can be turned into a "learned" Strength. You will also learn how to spot the personality type of others and how to speak their language.

The training is an interactive experience in learning about how our personality style affects all of our interpersonal relationships. It is a fun and down-to-earth program with no fancy jargon and skills each person can directly apply to their personal and work

lives. # What is Diversity? – by Maria Brown

Dictionary.com defines diversity as:

1. *The state or fact of being diverse; difference; unlikeness*
2. *Variety; multiformity*
3. *A point of difference*



The Unitarian Universalist Welcoming Congregation Resolution focuses on diversity in terms of sexual orientation and gender expression, but this is not the only form of diversity that is welcome in our congregational life here at First UU. We also enjoy a diversity of religious beliefs and faiths within our congregation. In fact, these diverse beliefs and faiths inform Unitarian Universalist practice in general, and along with our seven guiding principles, serve as the “backbone of our religious community” (UUA.org).

Our chancel window is a symbol of this spiritual diversity. The chancel window includes symbols representing a variety of world religions and faiths, all of which are welcome in our congregation. The First UU website describes the chancel window as “a symbolic representation of contemporary Unitarian Universalism - evolutionary nature, its inclusiveness, and its openness to all sources of wisdom and truth, both ancient and modern” (<http://www.firstuusyr.org/chancelwindow.html>).

This diversity of religious faiths and beliefs, and our openness to all sources of wisdom and truth, enable us to be a Welcoming Congregation. Many members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community may feel rejected by their childhood religions, but still hold dear the values and principles that informed their childhood faith. This is not true for everyone: some members of the LGBT community are searching for new beliefs; practice alternative faiths like humanism or earth-centered traditions; or may identify as atheists or agnostics. Regardless of their religious or spiritual beliefs, individuals with different sexual orientations and/or gender identities can find a home in Unitarian Universalism that welcomes the beliefs from which they draw spiritual and emotional strength. For example, while MaryGail and I do not share the same spiritual beliefs, we were searching for a spiritual home that we could share, and we have definitely found that here at First UU.



I am interested in hosting conversations in the near future about being a Welcoming Congregation. ## COMMUNITY SUPPORT PROJECTS

Interfaith Works' most visible project at First UU has been the Duck Race to end racism. Members have suggested the organizations to which we contribute BECAUSE OF their involvement.

We would like to make your community involvement visible at First UU especially with an emphasis on actual time and energy spent rather than "just" financial contributions. Do you donate time, "in-kind" or administrative services" "Go-Ferring," etc? We're thinking of having a Community Support project "Fair" at some point where you can bring in information about your special interests and share with others. 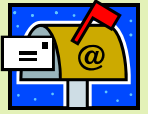
